



TENDENCIES OF TEACHING ENGLISH CONFUSING WORDS THROUGH DISTINCTIVE INNOVATIVE METHODS

- 3. Some words are mispronounced.

As "word nerds" and podcast hosts of NPR's "You're Saying it Wrong," we're constantly on the lookout for these mistakes. And we have seen them everywhere, from corporate reports, resumes and cover letters, to major publications. But if you are aware of the different meanings of these words, you won't fall into the same traps.[7]

These words can be both, homonyms as well as homophones. Homonyms are the words which have the same spelling but different meanings, whereas homophones are the words which have the same pronunciation but different meanings. [8]


